



Wild Turkey Population and Harvest Management





The spring 2010 turkey population was approximately 360,000, 13 percent higher than the previous 6-year average of 318,000 (Table 1).

Results of the recently published 2009 annual game-take survey, which surveys 2% of Pennsylvania general hunting license holders, showed that in 2009 PA hunters realized excellent turkey harvests as turkeys continued to be the second most popular game species. There were 228,903 hunters for the spring 2009 season, which was similar to the 10-year average of 228,561. Spring hunters also experienced one of the most successful spring seasons with a 19 percent success rate. Hunter success has exceeded this level during only 2 other years (2000 and 2001, with 20 and 21 percent success, respectively). The final 2009 spring harvest of 42,478 bearded birds (not including second birds harvested with the special turkey license) was 5 percent above spring 2008 (40,483), and 8 percent above the previous 10-year average, during which time we had record harvests of over 41,000 bearded birds from 2000-2004. With the 2009 spring harvest we are now back to harvests above 40,000 bearded birds. Preliminary results suggest the warm, dry spring weather provided excellent conditions for nesting and poult survival, so overall recruitment into the fall population is expected to be above average. Hens appeared to enter the spring 2010 breeding season in good condition despite the harsh winter as evidenced from the sample of 300 hens we captured for leg-banding and radio-tagging during the winter. Summer turkey sighting and hen productivity data currently are being analyzed to determine how this summer's turkey production compares to previous years.

Despite shorter fall seasons in 3 WMUs in 2009, participation increased from 2008 with 156,752 fall turkey hunters (152,294 in 2008) and 529,427 days fall turkey hunting (486,592 in 2008). Even so, participation remained over 20 percent below the previous 10-year average. The final fall 2009 harvest of 20,934 (24,288 in 2008) was 37 percent below the previous 10-year average, due to shorter seasons in almost half of the WMUs since 2004, poor recruitment, and the decline in participation. Hunter success (13 percent) also declined, mainly due to below average recruitment due to the cool, wet spring, and abundant mast crop which dispersed the small sized flocks making them more difficult for hunters to locate. Hunter success has been as high as 21 percent (2001, a year with excellent recruitment), and as low as 4 percent (1979).

Final preliminary 2010 harvests will be reported once the second harvest data have been tabulated.

Wild Turkey Hen Harvest Rates and Annual Survival Rates Study

The majority of my time was dedicated to trapping turkeys, as per wild turkey management plan strategy 1.9. I coordinated with PCFWRU at Penn State regarding data management and locating transmitters from mortalities. Trapping commenced on October 1 with 98 females banded; 65% of our trapping goal, which was better than anticipated due to the hot weather and abundant food supply which made bringing birds to bait difficult. Banding totals are: 57 in Study Area 1; 6 in Huntingdon, 5 in Mifflin, 16 in Bedford, 5 in Centre, 10 in Clearfield and 15 in Somerset County; and 41 were banded in Study Area 2; 10 in Lycoming, 5 in Tioga, 2 in Clinton, 14 in Elk County and 10 in the Northwest Region. Since the last reporting cycle, five additional hens have died; 3 were censored because they died less than 2 weeks after capture and the others were unknown causes. From the winter captures, we are monitoring 27 transmittered hens (of 61). Twenty of the transmitters retrieved from mortalities were redeployed during this trapping season.

Annual Cooperative PGC/NWTF/PANWTF Meeting

This meeting, held June 10 at the PGC headquarters, emphasizes the partnership between the PGC and NWTF/PANWTF and demonstrates the health and importance of this partnership. The PGC Executive Office and all pertinent PGC Bureaus participated. Meeting minutes were distributed to all attendees and the entire PANWTF Board.

Information and Education

After 11 years of service, Robert Boyd is no longer a technical representative on the NWTF Turkey Technical Committee due to Bob's transfer to Chief of the Special Services Division within the Bureau of Wildlife Management. He still maintains his position as Assistant Bureau Director.

In conjunction with BI&E, I continued work on revising the wild turkey web page. Completed a review of the final version of a manuscript I prepared for the Tenth National Wild Turkey Symposium

Regional Oak Mast Survey

Since 2006 the PA Game Commission has participated in the Annual Regional Oak Mast Survey, which is coordinated by the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries. Turkey harvest rates are lower during autumns with abundant mast crops because the abundance of food spreads the flocks making them more difficult for hunters to locate. Knowledge of annual variations in acorn crops is an important aspect of biggame management. Three surveys are conducted annually in PA.I conducted the Allegheny Mountains survey, while surveys also were conducted in the Ridge and Valley Province and the Northeastern Pocono Plateau. Both red and white oak acorn production were well above average with very large acorns on individual trees in the Allegheny Mountains and Ridge and Valley Province regions. However, the dry late summer weather desiccated acorns that dropped late in some areas, especially white oaks. Data for the Pocono Plateau area are pending.





<u>HB 2379</u> – Title - amending Local Option Small Games of Chance Act, further providing for definitions and for prize limits; providing for insured games; further providing for limited sales, for recordkeeping, for eligible organizations' use of locations for conducting small games of chance and for separate individual prize limitations; providing for licensed establishments; Referred to Gaming Oversight, March 29, 2010.

Marcellous Shale Extraction Severance Tax 5 bills out of 8 and many different amendments

HB 2435 – Tax Reform Bill of 1971 – including among other taxes, imposing a tax on the extraction of natural gas; providing for natural gas severance registration certificate. Places severance tax revenue for 2% for PGC and 3% for PFBC. Referred to Appropriations April 20, 2010.

PFSC Report and PFSC Fall Convention

October 3, 2010, Submitted by Don Heckman, PANWTF Delegate to PFSC


I was unable to attend PFSC Fall Convention, September 17-19, 2010, and requested Ed Tanczos to represent PA Chapter NWTF as Alternate Delegate.

At September 2010 PFSC Fall Convention the Board and Delegates approved membership fee increases for sportsmen's clubs, individual memberships, and organizations. Currently PANWTF pays \$1500 per year as state-wide conservation organization with delegate voting powers on PFSC Board, Delegate Session, Game and Trapping Committee. New membership fee for 2011 and 2012 will be \$1600, for 2013 and 2014 will be \$1700, and for 2015 and 2016 will be \$1800.

During Game & Trapping Committee meeting, PGC Executive Director Carl Roe and Mike DiMatteo, Chief Environmental Planning & Habitat Protection Director, gave a power point presentation on the Marcellus Shale Development on SGL's. Highlights of the presentation:

- 961,000 acres of the 1.4 million acres of SGL is over Marcellus Shale
- 87 permits on SGL's of the 4,015 permits issued in PA in 2009
- 31 wells drilled on SGL's of the 1,788 wells drilled in PA in 2009
- PGC must approve well locations and field review construction plans
- Who actually owns the mineral rights is still a big problem for some of the lands
- Impoundments need liners and safety fence
- Takes 15-30 days to drill 24/7
- Drilling casing is a big concern as it needs to get thru the fresh water zone without leaking
- · Threat of spread of invasive species
- Water must come from somewhere other than SGL's for fracking
- Impact to the surface is lessened by drilling many wells from one pad versus constructing many well pads
- Pipeline and well pads could be improved for small game habitat. So far, the PGC has been able to negotiate what plants are used to plant well sites and on pipelines
- Impact during hunting seasons are minimized.





- Need to develop BMP's for wildlife habitat with the oil & gas companies
- One well can affect 60-180 acres
- The gas royalty has not replaced the loss of the timber revenue over the last 3 years

After much discussion during the past year, delegates approved raising membership dues for clubs and individuals. Individual members will see their dues increase from \$20 to \$25 beginning January 1st, and individual sportsmen's club membership rates will also increase. This is the first increase in over 10 years.

As part of a new membership drive, clubs, counties, and divisions collecting individual PFSC membership dues from their members will be able to keep \$2 from each membership they obtain for PFSC.

The PFSC Spring convention will be held at the Country Cupboard Best Western in Lewisburg, March 11, 12, 13, 2011.

Wild Turkey Management changes requiring PGC Staff and Commissioner overview.

1) Support PGC Management Plan For Wild Turkeys In Pennsylvania, 2006-2015, goal, 8 objectives 47 strategies, with measurement timeline outlined, plans needs to be fully funded over the 10 years; management plan objectives and strategies are not being fully funded.

2) Northeast Wild Turkey Population Model – implement in wild turkey management plan – PA NWTF has \$15,000 invested in development; model data and modeling results are requirements for future wild turkey management decisions; no current update on data or model implementation.

3) Recommendation to extend last day of spring gobbler season to May 31, permanently ---

FINAL COMMISSIONER APPROVAL - BOC Meeting April 20, 2010.

4) Recommendation for Mentored Youth Hunting to including fall turkey hunting season in regulation starting in 2011. HB 281 Mentored Youth Fall Hunting passed House; Passed Senate Game and Fisheries and Appropriations Committees. Full Senate floor vote expected.

and Appropriations Committees. Full Senate floor vote expected.

PANWTF needs to support HB 281 to allow "tag sharing" with Mentored Youth Hunters and then work with PGC to get their support to including fall turkey hunting with fall deer[doe] hunting. PGC hang up is

tag sharing.

5) Recommendation to expand youth spring gobbler season and regular spring gobbler season to all day hunting after 4 year gobbler leg band research project is completed in 2009, project evaluation will be completed in 2010, and recommendations will be documented. At April 20, 2010 PGC Commissioner meeting they voted 8-0 to expand spring gobbler season for last two weeks of spring season to all day hunting starting Spring 2011.

6) Recommendation to expand youth spring gobbler to more than one day.

7) Continue recommendations to reduce or increase WMU fall season lengths as management plan setting fall season guidelines are determined; using management data based on current field data and indices, harvest densities, population densities, and hunter densities, as charted measurements outlined in the wild turkey management plan; when management data supports regulation change. Major negative fall turkey hunting regulations for season start and end date changes were adopted by PGC BOC at April 20 Meeting. PANWTF articles have been distributed documenting our disapproval and request for changes to 2011 Fall Turkey Hunting Season Regulations.

8) State-wide gobbler leg band research – 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 4 year study is completed. NWTF and PANWTF research project financial support was \$150,416 from NWTF Grant In Aid and PA Chapter NWTF Hunting Heritage Super Fund for research project equipment and trapping materials. Mary Jo has updated Board in her Tech Committee Reports on all aspects of research project to-date. Four year state-wide gobbler leg band study final analysis has been completed; final results and hunting public announcements will be completed soon. Penn State released an article. PGC research study results have been released, August 9, 2010.

- 9) PGC submitted Fall Hen Harvest Rates Study to NWTF Technical Committee requesting funding for state-wide hen research/telemetry study for 4 years 2010-2013. Bob Boyd resubmitted and presented NWTF Grant-In-Aid proposal for 2011-2013. NWTF Tech Committee is reviewing proposal. Mary Jo presented Hen Harvest Rate Study Executive Summary at January 2010 Board meeting and update at March 7, 2010 Board meeting. PANWTF continues evaluation for state chapter project funding for remaining 3 years. With major changes adopted for 2010 fall turkey hunting season dates Hen Harvest Rate Study will continue as scheduled with changes to Objectives. PGC and NWTF Wild Turkey Biologists are reviewing research study and will update PANWTF Board.
- 10) PÅ Chapter NWTF has submitted position statement on 2010 Fall Turkey Hunting Season date changes to PGC Commissioners and Executive Staff. PA Chapter NWTF has also submitted position statement for news release across Pennsylvania, and submitted articles in Turkey Talk. NWTF Dr. James Earl Kennamer submitted support letter to PGC, Aug, 11, 2010.
- 11) Wild Turkey Biologists Spring Options white paper has been finalized for PGC Executive Staff and Commissioner's review. PANWTF is reviewing white paper for future strategies and recommendations to see where PANWTF will support PGC and turkey biologists on their recommendations.


12) June 10, 2010, PGC Staff meeting with PA Chapter NWTF representatives in Harrisburg Headquarters building was held. Meeting agenda and minutes will be forth coming.

Legislation changes require Governor signature.

1) PGC hunting license increase legislation – SB 740 in Senate Game and Fisheries Committee. PANWTF continues years of support for PGC additional hunting license revenue, and supporting alternative funding







option recommendations. Turkey Hunting License – continue with our position statement, articles and news release supporting need for spring turkey hunting license, support fully funded wild turkey management plan to complete yearly objectives and strategies. No Senate movement on hunting license increase or alternative funding legislation.

2) Support Sunday hunting as regulated by PGC, required legislation to change Title 34 Game Code. No House movement on Sunday hunting legislation HB 779.

3) Do not support legislation [Title 34 Game Code] through legislative wording that changes PGC hunting seasons, bag limits, and shooting hours. PGC hunting seasons, bag limits, and shooting hours are changed by Board of Commissioners through PGC Regulation [Title 58 Code].

4) PANWTF Legislative Committee Report details legislative bills working through the process or have been signed by the Governor.

5) Two important legislative bills have been signed by Governor Rendell, HB 1859 – increased fines and penalties for illegally taking of wildlife; HB 1890 – Rockview Property in Spring Creek Canyon has been completed with sub dividing 1829 acres.

Other Committee actions requiring PA Chapter NWTF Board participation and overview.

1) PANWTF Spring Turkey Hunter Cooperative Program for Spring 2010 has been completed. Jim will review program at July Board meeting.

Other Committee actions requiring PGC Staff and Commissioner participation and overview.

1) Turkey hunter safety and ethics – Comprehensive PGC wild turkey hunter safety - NWTF Turkey Hunter Safety DVD provided to PGC HTE classes and availability to general hunting public; helping PGC reach out to 300,000+- turkey hunters with additional turkey hunter safety and ethics information and material; PA Edition NWTF Turkey Hunting Success and Safety brochure; NWTF Turkey Hunter Safety Task Force material;

2) Annually review of meeting minutes from PGC Executive Staff and PA NWTF June meeting as provided by PGC Wild Turkey Biologist Mary Jo Casalena. Final June 2010 meeting minutes will be forwarded to PGC Staff and PANWTF Board. Important wild turkey management criteria and decision making changes have been accomplished since these joint partnership yearly meetings started back in the mid 1980's. Continue request for PGC wild turkey biologist to update PA Chapter Board at the January and June board meetings on status of Objectives and Strategies as outlined in the PGC Management Plan For Wild Turkeys In Pennsylvania.

3) NWTF wild turkey management outreach programs - Wild Turkey Woodlands, Habitat Management, Safety Education, Land Acquisition, Conservation Seed programs, Project HELP, Operation Appleseed, Operation Oak, other budgeted NWTF outreach programs and HHSF Super Fund expenditures, support funding for NWTF's Pennsylvania Comprehensive Wild Turkey Management Plan, continue distributing PANWTF news releases and articles in Turkey Talk, Tell The Story – Pass It On.
